Ross served man and nation

Vow at memorial service to make RSL stalwart's vision a reality

UNDREDS attended a memorial

memorial service yesterday for Ross Coulter, the RSL stalwart and tireless worker for his beloved Emu Park.

Service veterans were joined by townsfolk in paying tribute to the 65-year-old former high-school art teacher who died on Saturday – the same day as his vision for the redevelopment of the Emu Park foreshore near the RSL Memorial Hall was revealed in The Morning Bulletin.

Brian Vains, RSL branch president, gave a moving eulogy in which he described Ross's 32 years of service to the RSL and wider community.

"His service record tells us how well he served this nation. How well he served his fellow man is known to all members of the RSL and Emu Park who stand and mourn with me today," he said.

"If anything was happening in Emu Park to help better the community, then you could bet that Ross Coulter was out there either leading or playing a major role."

Mr Vains pledged that branch members would do everything possible to realise his ambition to transform the wasteland near the town cenotaph into an attractive landscaped park.

"In recent weeks Ross had been working on a centenary of Anzac project concept

and last week he made a presentation of his concept to Rockhampton Regional Council.

"For those who saw the article in last Saturday's Morning Bulletin, would have seen it as an example of the creativity, the skills and the drive that Ross possessed.

The assembly was told Ross was called up for national service on January 31, 1967, and fought in Vietnam with the 1st Battalion Royal Australian Regiment.


