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EMU Park's beach front will become even more extraordinary when an historic landmark is created to honour the Spirit of Anzac.

The estimated overall cost of Stage One of the project will be about \$1.2 million with \$875,000 in funding already secured.

Member for Keppel Bruce Young was able to contribute \$250,000 from the State Government, Homecorp put forward \$100,000 and Emu Park's Bendigo Bank donated \$150,000.

As part of the Centenary of Anzac Celebrations in 2015, Livingstone Shire Council in partnership with the State Government, Emu Park RSL Club, Bendigo Community Bank, and Home Corp Pty Ltd announced the launch of the Emu Park Centenary of Anzac Project.

An Anzac Commemoration Precinct will be created to feature integrated street-scaping, rotundas, parkland enhancement, and an interpretive "memorial walkway" around Emu Park's scenic foreshore headland. The interpretive walkway will also provide a strategic link connecting the Town Centre and Bell Park with the iconic Singing Ship Monument, RSL Cenotaph, and Surf Lifesaving Club.

Vision of shoreline was Ross's dream

YOU could see the joy and relief in Kate Coulter's eyes yesterday as her husband Ross's dream for the Emu Park shoreline was finally realised.

After a lot of hard work and tireless hours pushing for the project since 2011, Kate and the Emu Park RSL Centenary of ANZAC steering committee celebrated the success at the announcement yesterday.

Kate said Emu Park was a very special place to her and Ross, who has since passed on, and this would be something she and everyone else involved in the project and the community could remember him by.

"It is such a relief because for a long time I thought it may never happen," Kate said while overlooking the ocean.

"But Barry Vains has worked really really hard on this. And then the steering committee formed with the new council and we've been meeting monthly



sometimes fortnightly to get it all up and running."

Barry, who was with Ross during the time he came up with the concept, said he pledged to Kate that he would make this dream of Ross's come true.

"We adopted the idea and five days after we presented it to council Ross sadly passed away," Barry said.

"It's been very frustrating at times, but it's a great feeling to see it reach this point."

Kate said Ross formed a foreshore committee just for Emu Park to try to beautify the foreshore.

"This was one area I think he had in mind for a long, long time," she said.

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
